

832 ADDING TO OUR FAITH. II Pet. 1:5-9

I. A faith to add to

1. Not the false faith of a heretic

A. Who is a heretic?

B. His faith is false

2. Not the feigned faith of a hypocrite.

A. Who is a hypocrite?

B. What is his judgment?

C. How faith can be feigned.

3. Not the fruitless faith of the mere

formal professor. (see v.8)

A. Difference between professors & possessors

B. Importance of searching your soul.

C. Faith that is fruitless is dead.

4. But the true faith of a Christian.

A. Who is a Christian?

(1). One who acknowledges his sin and need  
of a Savior.

(2). One who repents of his sin.

(3). One who has sincere faith in Christ.

(a). Believes that Christ is the Son of  
God, died for our sins, rose again.

(b). A heart belief.

(c). Active faith that definitely  
accepts Christ as personal Savior  
and publicly confesses Him.

II. Yet however real and sincere this faith is,  
it can still be supplemented. Peter's lan-  
guage could be translated "supplement your  
faith with virtue, and virtue with knowledge."

1. Our salvation is complete. The atoning  
work of Christ is complete. We cannot  
add anything to that.

2. But after we are saved there are many graces  
of the Christian life that can be added.

III Notice that God's way of adding to our  
faith is by subtraction.

1. If you add virtue you must subtract all  
forms of moral or spiritual weakness.

2. If you add knowledge you must subtract  
ignorance.

3. If you add self-control you must subtract passionate and carnal excesses.
4. If you add patience you must subtract impatience.
5. If you add godliness you must subtract ungodliness.
6. If you add brotherly kindness you must subtract hatred and courtesy.
7. If you add love you must subtract all ill-will. Both Peter and Paul make love the climaxing characteristic of the genuine Christian.
